Where do they live?

Honey Badgers can adapt to a variety of conditions, from cool mountains to warm rainforests. They are found throughout most of Sub-Saharan Africa, Saudi Arabia, Iran and Western Asia.

What do they eat?

Honey Badgers get their name from their fondness for feeding on honey and honeybee larvae, but they also eat insects, amphibians, reptiles, birds, and mammals, as well as roots, bulbs, berries, and fruits.

One cub at a time

They often travel alone, though it's not uncommon to spot mating pairs. Honey Badgers mate all year and often have just one cub at a time.

Appearance

Although they are small, weighing around 25lbs or 11kg and standing 12 inches or 30cm tall, they are mighty! They can bluff, growl and charge their way out of any situation, even warding off entire prides of lions.

Threat for hunters

Honey Badgers are threatened by hunting in certain regions for food, traditional medicine or as a hunter's trophy. They are often also persecuted by farmers or beekeepers.
